1	Statue of Liberty	The Statue of Liberty is a colossal neoclassical sculpture on Liberty Island in New York Harbor in New York City, in the United States. The copper statue, a gift from the people of France to the people of the United States, was designed by French sculptor Frédéric Auguste Bartholdi and built by Gustave Eiffel. The Statue of Liberty is a figure of a robed woman representing Libertas, a Roman goddess. She holds a torch above her head, and in her left arm carries a tabula ansata inscribed in Roman numerals with "JULY IV MDCCLXXVI" (July 4, 1776), the date of the U.S. Declaration of Independence. A broken chain lies at her feet. The statue became an icon of freedom and of the United States, and was a welcoming sight to immigrants arriving from abroad.
2	Chinatown/ Little Italy	It's one of Manhattan's oldest and most enchanting historic districts. CSL will take you on a relaxing stroll through SoHo, Little Italy and Chinatown. Join us as we gawk at the Fashionistas and cast iron buildings of Soho, visit New York's and America's first "pizzeria" or take a stab at bargaining with a street vendor in Chinatown.
3	Top of the Rock	It's the Top of Rockerfeller Center, which gives you unobstructed views of both Central Park and Manhattan's midtown and downtown skyscrapers, the view of Top of the Rock is truly one of a kind. The Top of the Rock is one of the greatest observation decks available, and the experience is far better with memories of the city views becoming long-lasting in the form of photographs.
4	Times Square	Times Square is a major commercial intersection, tourist destination, entertainment center and neighborhood in the Midtown Manhattan section of New York City at the junction of Broadway and Seventh Avenue. It stretches from West 42nd to West 47th Streets. Brightly adorned with billboards and advertisements, Times Square is sometimes referred to as "The Crossroads of the World", "The Center of the Universe", "the heart of The Great White Way", and the "heart of the world". One of the world's busiest pedestrian areas, it is also the hub of the Broadway Theater District and a major center of the world's entertainment industry. Times Square is one of the world's most visited tourist attractions, drawing an estimated 50 million visitors annually. Approximately 330,000 people pass through Times Square daily, many of them tourists, while over 460,000 pedestrians walk through Times Square on its busiest days.
5	9/11 Memorial	The National September 11 Memorial & Museum (also known as the 9/11 Memorial and 9/11 Memorial Museum) are a memorial and museum in New York City commemorating the September 11, 2001 attacks, which killed 2,977 victims, and the World Trade Center bombing of 1993, which killed six. The memorial is located at the World Trade Center site, the former location of the Twin Towers that were destroyed during the September 11 attacks.
6	Brooklyn Bridge & Dumbo Lookout	Walk over from Manhattan to DUMBO. Head to the Brooklyn Bridge Park for the view, get some ice cream at the Brooklyn Ice Cream Factory, and some pizza at Grimaldi's. It's a great place to rest by the water of the east river and a spectacular view of the bridge together with the new Tower one coming up
7	Six Flags Theme Park	Featuring hundreds of roller coasters, thrill rides and family attractions, Six Flags is the biggest regional theme park company in the world!
8	Boston Public Garden	Boston Public Garden, is a large park in the heart of Boston, Massachusetts, adjacent to Boston Common. It is a part of the Emerald Necklace system of parks, and is bounded by Charles Street and Boston Common to the east, Beacon Street to the north, Arlington Street and Back Bay to the west, and Boylston Street to the south. The Public Garden was the first public botanical garden in America.
9	USS Constitution Museum	The USS Constitution Museum is located in the Charlestown Navy Yard, which is part of the Boston National Historical Park in Boston, Massachusetts, United States. The museum is situated near the ship USS Constitution at the end of Boston's Freedom Trail. The museum is housed in a restored shipyard building at the foot of Pier 2. The museum, through its collections and interactive exhibits, tells the story of Constitution ("Old Ironsides") and the people who designed, built, and sailed her. The museum is also home to the Samuel Eliot Morison Memorial Library and includes a comprehensive archival repository of records related to the ship's history.
10	New State House	New State House, is the state capitol and seat of government for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, located in the Beacon Hill/Downtown neighborhood of Boston. The building houses the Massachusetts General Court (state legislature) and the offices of the Governor of Massachusetts. It is considered a masterpiece of Federal architecture and among Bulfinch's finest works, and was designated a National Historic Landmark for its architectural significance.
11	Old State House	The Old State House is the oldest and most important public building in American history prior to the Revolution, where John Adams insisted, "Independence was born." Step back in time at this must-see destination on the Freedom Trail!
12	Faneuil Hall & Quincy Market	Faneuil Hall Marketplace in Boston is filled with unique retail, delicious food and non-stop entertainment. Faneuil Marketplace consists of four historic buildings dating back to the 1800s, including Quincy Market and Freedom Trail site, Faneuil Hall where the Boston Tea Party rebellion against British Taxation began. Quincy Market is a historic market complex near Faneuil Hall in downtown Boston, Massachusetts. It was constructed in 1824-26 and named in honor of Mayor Josiah Quincy, who organized its construction without any tax or debt. The market is a designated National Historic Landmark and Boston Landmark, significant as one of the largest market complexes built in the United States in the first half of the 19th century.
13	Bunker Hill	Fifty years after the battle, the Marquis De Lafayette set the cornerstone of what would become a lasting monument and tribute to the memory of the Battle of Bunker Hill. The project was ambitious: construct a 221-foot tall obelisk built entirely from quarried granite. It took over seventeen years to complete, but it still stands to this day atop a prominence of the battlefield now known as Breed's Hill.
14	Harvard University	Harvard University is a private Ivy League research university in Cambridge, Massachusetts, established in 1636, whose history, influence, and wealth have made it one of the world's most prestigious universities.
